




INEZ DEMUYNCK Dawson Creek Contemplating Survival colour photographs

The Scars Will Stay pen & ink

I find it challenging to translate an idea or social concept into a visual form. With this work, The Scars Will Stay, my process included examination of many problems: external design implications, re-evaluation & a deep inner questioning. The personal growth which I have attained - both as an artist & as a woman - are evident to me within this image. In retrospect, the exaggerated scars, people in background, calligraphy pen & paper I wrote upon, all helped to illustrate other dimensions of the idea. The use of pen & ink has several meanings: first, the illustration of the idea as black & white, & second but more important, the fact that the media of pen & ink forces one to slow down. In a world which moves all too quickly, I realize a temporary escape, where work is slow & meticulous, & mistakes can be your friend.


DEAN MATTSON Untitled


DON MATTSON Dawson Creek Sweetwater Road #3




EMILY MATTSON View Thru' A Board Fence
